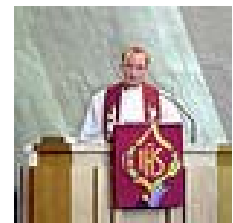

Christmas in Norway



The Norwegian soprano May-Britt Forsberg Hovdenak finished her master degree in Performing Art at The New Opera Academy and at The Royal Conservatory of The Hague, in The Netherlands in Spring 2001. She graduated with distinction. She has performed roles as Donna Elvira (*Don Giovanni*), Venus (*La Dafne*) and Dorabella (*Cosi van Tutte*), and selected scenes as Marenka (*Die Verkaufte Braut*) and Tatyana (*Eugéne Onegin*). She has sung in the choir at The Norwegian National Opera and given recitals and been engaged as a soloist in The Netherlands, Germany, and throughout Norway. She moved to St. Paul summer 2006, and is in the singing program at The Institute of Vocal Artistry working with Professor Emerita Elizabeth Mannion.

Sorle S. Hovdenak is an ordained pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Norway. He is in the PhD program at Luther Seminary in Systematic Theology, where he is doing research on the importance of the doctrine of Scripture in Lutheran Theology.

We welcome May-Britt and Sorle at our November meeting. Sorle will speak about modern Scandinavian Christmas traditions, but he will also relate to how Christmas has been traditionally celebrated throughout Norway. May-Britt will sing traditional Norwegian Christmas songs.

New Norwegian Grammar Dictionary

A new Norwegian grammar dictionary has recently been published which is authored by Cathrine Rysst and Daren Sylvester. Most dictionaries define words or give us the equivalent in another language, but as a rule they are not all that helpful in providing the student with specific examples of how to use words in a sentence. This book clarifies word usage in dictionary format.

Using years of classroom experience, the authors have identified the most common frustrations that students have in the use of grammar. This book grew out of the need for students to have, at their fingertips, a comprehensive explanation of the most difficult grammatical concepts in an easy-to-read and understandable dictionary format. Simply look up the word you are having problems with alphabetically. With this book's unique format you will find, not just examples of use (as simple grammar books give), or a simple definition (as regular dictionaries give), but also detailed dictionary definitions, rules of use, all possible conjugated endings, multiple examples, idiomatic phrases, detailed notes of use, as well as warnings of how not to use the word improperly.

Cathrine Rysst studied at the University of Oslo and Oslo University College. She has long and varied teaching experience in Norwegian as a second language and is also a certified English teacher.

Daren Sylvester is a former teacher of English as a second language, with a master's degree from the University of Kentucky.

The Clog Almanac

The clog almanac is the oldest known Norwegian calendar and also served as a work plan. It is carved out of wood formed like a sword, stave or arc. Each day had a special notch. The notches were carved a little deeper for the permanent holidays and the saints had their special red-letter days and symbols. The symbols were often interpreted literally. There were times for winter fishing, for brewing beer, butchering, making candles and baking. Many places still observe spring signs and traditions.

Norway - the Best Place to Live

For the fourth year in a row, the United Nations has ranked Norway as having the highest standard of living in the world. Sweden, Australia and Canada are next in line, while the United States is further down the scale. The annual ranking is based largely on average levels of education and income, combined with expected length of lifetime.

The report measured standards of living in 177 countries around the world. Other Nordic countries also ranked high, with Iceland in 7th place, Finland 13th and Denmark 17th.

Norway's gross national product per person amounted to USD 36,600, beaten only by Luxembourg. Its men and women are expected to live to an age of 78.9 years and Norway is one of 19 countries in the world with no measurable rates of illiteracy.

Researchers for the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) also weighed countries' degrees of cultural freedom in their analysis. They called cultural freedom a "basic human right," and awarded high scores in this year's UN Human Development Report to countries that accept immigrant cultures in addition to their own.

Norway's cultural diversity has blossomed in recent years, and public policies are aimed at integrating various ethnic groups and promoting tolerance. Norway also was lauded for its high literacy rate in addition to educational levels and material wealth. Norwegians themselves generally point to their country's scenic beauty, recreational opportunities, clean water and fresh air.

The United States landed in eighth place on the list, while France, for example, was 16th. The worst countries in which to live are all in Africa, according to the UN report. All 23 nations at the bottom of the list were African, with war-torn Sierra Leone in last place.

This and That

The Corner Library

The Strange American Way is a history's record of the immigrant's assimilation into the American culture in the Middle West during 1855-1859. It features the letters of Caja Munch, who as a young bride accompanied her husband, Johan Storm Munch, from Norway to Wisconsin where he received his first call to become pastor of several newly organized Norwegian Lutheran congregations. Caja wrote the letters to her parents mostly in the lonely hours at the Wiota, Wisconsin parsonage. The letters are long and detailed. In Caja's hand, the conscious art of letter writing turns into a rather charming, almost naïve chatter of a young girl writing in confidence to her mother.

As a supplement to the letters, Peter A. and Helene Much, have included excerpts from Pastor Johan Storm Munch's autobiography "*Via Mea*" which he wrote 50 years after the visit to America. The five chapters tell of their journey to America, arrival in Wiota, life in America and the journey back to Kristiania and finally to Hovland, Norway.

The book concludes with an essay by Peter A. Munch, a sociologist and grandson of Johan and Caja Munch. What is most interesting is that Peter Munch grew up hearing his father talk about "the letters" which Caja Munch had written home to her parents in Norway. Peter Munch's interest continued in sociological studies of Norwegian settlements for the University of Wisconsin. The old stone church, where his grandfather preached, is still standing in Wiota in Lafayette County and is now believed to be the oldest Norwegian Lutheran Church in America in actual use. The archives of the Wiota Lutheran Church included minutes of some rather stormy congregation meetings which revealed some of the reasons why Pastor Johan Storm Munch returned to Norway a year earlier than planned.

Where are the original letters? It was learned in 1949 that a family member donated "the letters" to the University Library in Oslo without the other family members' knowledge and consent. Caja Munch's letters from Wisconsin are now in the manuscript collection of the University of Oslo. It is a handwritten historical record of people, their struggles, failures and achievements on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean.

The Rise of Jonas Olsen, A Norwegian Immigrant's Saga, by Johannes B. Wist was donated by Ardyce Davies to the Synnove-Nordkap Lodge Library on October 9, 2007. The Norwegian-American Historical Association collaborated with the University of Minnesota Press in presenting Johannes Wist's widely read trilogy in a skillful English translation by Orm Overland.

So the preacher repeated the question in an even sterner tone, "Where is God?" Again, the boy made no attempt to answer.

The preacher raised his voice even more, shook his finger in the boy's face, and belted, "Where is God?" The boy screamed and bolted from the room, ran directly home and dove into his closet, slamming the door behind him.
